It all adds up


- If you read with your child for just 1 minute a day, then this equates to 180 minutes per academic year. On average, you will be reading 56,400 words per year with your child!
- *If you read with your child for 5 minutes per day, then this equates to 900 minutes per academic year. On average, you will be reading 282,000 words per year with your child!
- * If you read with your child for 5 minutes per day, then this equates to 3600 minutes per academic year. On average, you will be reading 1,800,000 words per year with your child!



How to help your child read this book

This book gives your child extra practice in reading a story that includes sounds he or she has learnt at school.

Ask your child to read the Story Green Words and Red Words below, before reading the story. Do not read the story to your child first. Point to the words as he or she reads. If your child hesitates, help him or her to sound-blend the word.

Re-read each sentence or page to keep the plot moving. Children's attention is focused on reading the words, and they find it hard to focus on the story at the same time.

Don't make them struggle too much and praise them when they succeed. Do it all with patience and love!

Red Words

Read stories to your children that are beyond the level they can read for themselves – every evening. They'll only want to become readers if they experience the joy of listening to a range of stories, non-fiction and poetry. Very soon, they will be able to read those books for themselves, as well as listen to them.

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What to do if your child is stuck

- Use phonics first. What sound does the word begin with? Can you say the sounds in the word? Blend them together.
- Read to the end of the sentence. What would make sense?
- What is the text about what might fit here?
- Does it sound right?
- Look at the picture. Does it help?





Being a role Asking model - get effective caught reading! questions

Reinforcing taught phonemes/sight words

Encourage wide reading - range of genres

Supporting your child to read is the most important thing you can do to help your child succeed!

Your child's ability to read directly impacts their ability to write!

Reading together is fun and helps build relationships!

The impact lasts a lifetime. Successful readers tend to be more imaginative and confident!

Children learn by example, so if they see you reading, they are likely to want to join in.

Talk, talk, talk! More able readers are better speakers. The wider and richer your child's vocabulary and knowledge and experience of the world around them, the better their comprehension will be!
